**Loan Amount:** Up to \$5 million per project • **Interest Rate:** Maximum 1%

**Loan Term:** Up to 10 years (see also [381.4015 Florida Statutes](#))

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## Eligibility

Per [s. 381.4015\(7\)\(b\)\(1\), Florida Statutes](#), the entities listed below are eligible to apply for a Health Care Innovation Revolving Loan.

1. **The following specific types of entities** licensed, registered, or certified by the Agency for Health Care Administration as provided under [s. 408.802, Florida Statutes](#):
  - (2) Birth centers, as provided under chapter 383, Florida Statutes.
  - (4) Crisis stabilization units, as provided under parts I and IV of chapter 394, Florida Statutes.
  - (5) Short-term residential treatment facilities, as provided under parts I and IV of chapter 394, Florida Statutes.
  - (6) Residential treatment facilities, as provided under part IV of chapter 394, Florida Statutes.
  - (7) Residential treatment centers for children and adolescents, as provided under part IV of chapter 394, Florida Statutes.
  - (8) Hospitals, as provided under part I of chapter 395, Florida Statutes.
  - (9) Ambulatory surgical centers, as provided under part I of chapter 395, Florida Statutes.
  - (10) Nursing homes, as provided under part II of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
  - (11) Assisted living facilities, as provided under part I of chapter 429, Florida Statutes.
  - (12) Home health agencies, as provided under part III of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
  - (14) Companion services or homemaker services providers, as provided under part III of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.

### *Eligibility continued...*

- (15) Adult day care centers, as provided under part III of chapter 429, Florida Statutes.
- (16) Hospices, as provided under part IV of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (17) Adult family-care homes, as provided under part II of chapter 429, Florida Statutes.
- (18) Homes for special services, as provided under part V of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (19) Transitional living facilities, as provided under part XI of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (20) Prescribed pediatric extended care centers, as provided under part VI of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (21) Home medical equipment providers, as provided under part VII of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (22) Intermediate care facilities for persons with developmental disabilities, as provided under part VIII of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.
- (24) Health care clinics, as provided under part X of chapter 400, Florida Statutes.

- 2. Education or clinical training providers** in partnership with the types of entities listed in # 1 above.

Per [s. 381.4015\(7\)\(b\)\(1\), Florida Statutes](#), the following types of entities are **NOT** eligible for a Health Care Innovation Revolving Loan.

- 1. The entities identified in s. 408.802(1), (3), (13), (23), and (25), Florida Statutes**, are not eligible:
- (1) Laboratories authorized to perform testing under the Drug-Free Workplace Act, as provided under ss. 112.0455 and 440.102.
  - (3) Abortion clinics, as provided under chapter 390.
  - (13) Nurse registries, as provided under part III of chapter 400.
  - (23) Health care services pools, as provided under part IX of chapter 400.
  - (25) Organ, tissue, and eye procurement organizations, as provided under part V of chapter 765.

### Priority

Priority will be given to applicants located in a **rural or medically underserved areas**, as designated by the Florida Department of Health, as follows:

- 1. Rural hospitals, defined in [s. 395.602\(2\), Florida Statutes](#), as acute care hospitals licensed under chapter 395, Florida Statutes, having 100 or fewer licensed beds and an emergency room, and are:**
  - (1) The sole provider within a county with a population density of up to 100 persons per square mile;
  - (2) An acute care hospital, in a county with a population density of up to 100 persons per square mile, which is at least 30 minutes of travel time, on normally traveled roads under normal traffic conditions, from any other acute care hospital within the same county;
  - (3) A hospital supported by a tax district or subdistrict whose boundaries encompass a population of up to 100 persons per square mile;
  - (4) A hospital classified as a sole community hospital under 42 C.F.R. s. 412.92, regardless of the number of licensed beds;
  - (5) A hospital with a service area that has a population of up to 100 persons per square mile. As used in this subparagraph, the term “service area” means the fewest number of zip codes that account for 75 percent of the hospital’s discharges for the most recent 5-year period, based on information available from the hospital inpatient discharge database in the Florida Center for Health Information and Transparency at the agency; or
  - (6) A hospital designated as a critical access hospital, as defined in s. 408.07, Florida Statutes.
  
- 2. Nonprofit entities that accept Medicaid patients.**
